PRESIDENT'S PEN



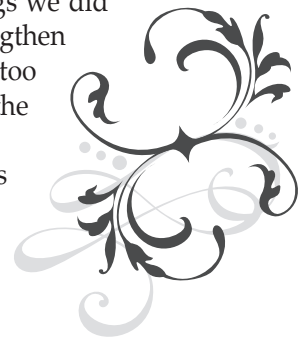

Junior Gardeners

Although Janet Cain has completed her term on the PDHS Board, she has graciously agree to continue on as the Junior Gardener Coordinator. This program has grown by leaps and bounds under her leadership and we are grateful to have her. Thanks Janet!!

Plans are already being made for this years' Junior Gardener Program.

The program begins in early April and runs for six weeks. As you know, we have more than 150 students who participate. It is a very popular program with our local schools and young students. In order to have the program run smoothly we need your help in many small ways. Please help by providing cuttings of houseplants rooted in small pots. If you are unable to pot up the plants, please bring them to our March meeting so that Janet can get them potted up. These plants are for each student to take care of, watch and observe over the course of the program, then each student is given a plant at the end.

We are also looking for plastic strawberry containers with lids – these are used by each student as a greenhouse to learn how to grow plants from seeds. We also need clean Styrofoam trays to fit under the strawberry containers. We are collecting tuna and salmon cans which are used as containers for the Mother's Day floral arrangements each student creates. Other items that we need are yogurt containers (500g) with lids, gift bags (8x10) and Canadian Tire money to help offset the cost of soil, seeds, etc. If you are interested in helping enrich young people by teaching them the basics of gardening and have an hour or two to spare once a week, for six weeks from April to mid-May, please see Janet Cain or Kathy Allen. Cleaning Gardening Tools Pays Off In The Long Run

Use rubbing alcohol to wipe down and disinfect pruners, shovels and any other tools that have touched dirt or plants otherwise tools can spread bacteria or other pathogens between plants. Use steel wool to remove caked-on dirt and grime/rust.

Placing a nylon knee-high stocking over the downspout stops chipmunks and squirrels from having easy access to the house. If the stocking gets clogged

with debris, take it off, shake it out, turn inside out and replace.

Creative Ways To Add Pizzazz To Your Garden

- Attach old enamel pots, kettles and other interesting 'found' objects to the walls of your garden shed, garage or outbuildings.

- At the dump, keep an eye open for interesting objects such as a porch or bed post to add to the middle of the garden, and then perhaps perch a bird house on the top.

- Old toys and crafts can look good in the garden, e.g. doll carriage, bicycle, etc.

- Throughout my garden I have placed rocks brought back from memorable vacations. Writing on the back in indelible ink where they came from and the date ensures you won't forget.

- Rusted pieces of farm machinery and interesting logs and cedar stumps can be eye catching when placed in the middle of flowers such as phlox, black-eyed Susans, or just because.

- Don't forget the plants themselves. Grouping large sections of say, chickens and hens, adds interest and draws the eye.

- A water feature does not have to be large. Add a small pool, say 2 x 3 x 18" deep and watch the wildlife (frogs, toads, birds of all kinds) take pleasure in your small, but important addition. Their continued action around the pool discourages mosquitoes laying their eggs.

- Got an area that just doesn't seem to want to grow anything? Add a potted plant, or three, the height of which would depend on the area you are trying to fill in.
